Letter from Revd Joanna Fielding

Dear friends,

Thank you for the warm welcome that we have received, at the service at Offenham last week, and as we walk around the area. David and I are so pleased to be here, and very much looking forward to all that lies ahead. It has been such a long wait before I could come and I am so grateful to the East Vale ministry team and colleagues who have been taking services in the meantime.

I am originally from North Devon, where my school friends were from the local farms (beef or dairy mostly), so the seasonal rhythms of rural life are very familiar to me. After university, I worked for a couple of years as a secondary school teacher in a Methodist-run secondary school in Zimbabwe before returning to the UK and the Midlands, where David and I raised our children, and I worked as a Careers Adviser in Northamptonshire. I also trained as a Lay Reader and was taking services in Leicester Diocese for some years.

In 2004 we moved to Dunedin, South Island of New Zealand, where we had 15 very happy years. I joined David (a professor in Development Economics) at Otago University where I found work as an administrator for some years,

before returning to Careers Guidance work, this time with adults, helping them to retrain and find new direction after life-changing injuries. In 2012 I was ordained, and by 2014 I was serving as vicar for a large rural area (the Otago Peninsula) on the outskirts of the city. As far as I know, I am the only vicar in the world to have had an albatross colony in her parish; we used to ring the church bell when they returned to the headland each Spring.

In 2019 we followed our daughter Anna (who was a postgraduate in London) back to the UK to be nearer our families again. There were also so many aspects of life in Britain that I missed - people, places, ancient buildings carrying such deep history - and being able to get mushy peas with fish and chips! David was offered a post at Manchester University, and we moved to West Yorkshire where I have served as Associate Priest in the Colne Valley near Huddersfield for the last 3 years, giving me some familiarity with working within the English parish church world again! We lived near Marsden Moor, with beef, dairy and sheep farming neighbours (can you see a pattern here.....?) who became our good friends too.

We enjoyed our time in Yorkshire, but I saw the advertisement for the East Vale vacancy and ...here we are! "My lot has fallen in a fair and pleasant land" (Psalm 16 v6) and I keep thinking of this verse as I explore the Vale. It is so beautiful here, and I am so pleased that I have been able to come and share and explore this life with you across our parishes.

Advent and Christmas are just around the corner, with all its special seasonal events and services. Please come and say hello if you see me at your church, in the school, shop, or out and about (with or without Lilyru our cockerpoo). As your Priest in Charge, I hold you all in my prayers each day, and I am very much looking forward to getting to know you better over the coming weeks and months. I wish you an expectant Advent full of hope for the future, and a joyful Christmas as we celebrate God's Son dwelling among us as Love, here with God's people in this beautiful land. God bless you.

Update on Kings Arms Steering Group

Over the weekend of 20th-22nd October more than 280 copies of the Community Survey were hand delivered within Cleeve Prior and surrounding farms as well as to households in Bickmarsh and Marlcliff. Members of the Steering Group collected these the following weekend which gave many opportunities for you to ask more questions and understand better the aims of the steering group. Other replies were received electronically and still more were hand delivered to the Village Hall. In all, we collected, or received, 122 completed forms; a very high return for such a survey. Thanks to all of you who took the time to do this; the information you have provided is vital to our understanding of what will make a successful pub in the future. The highlights from the survey are:

- 95% of respondents agreed that maintaining the village pub was important or very important
- 51% indicated their interest in buying shares in the Community Share Offer
- 22% said they would make donations
- 36% would volunteer in running the pub
- 74% preferred "good honest pub grub"
- 70% would support special food theme nights eg curry nights
- 57% would like regular quiz nights
- 37% of respondents would support an afternoon café
- A warm, friendly and welcoming atmosphere with competitive pricing of good beer, interesting wine list and regular opening hours were all highlighted as essential factors in a successful pub.

In addition to the survey, the Steering Group have visited the New Inn at Norton Lindsey and The Fox at Loxley, both successful community owned pubs to learn from their experience. In line with most other community owned businesses, we will form a Community Benefit Society (CBS) as the legal structure for raising capital, and purchasing the pub. We have joined the Plunkett Foundation (with help from a grant from the Cleeve Prior Parish Council), who will support registration of our Community Benefit Society with the Financial Conduct Authority. They also provide Model Rules for the governance of CBS's such as ours. An initial survey of the property was carried out. We are finalising our formal business planning and Community Share Offer documents and are actively exploring sources of grant aid from various local and national organisations. We will shortly be launching a dedicated website for the Cleeve Prior Community Pub CBS and intend to publicise our campaign to secure the Kings Arms for future generations to as wide an audience as possible. NEWS FROM FIELD BARN

Another busy month from Noel and Gina

HEART OF ENGLAND FOREST: Our volunteers have been busy this month looking after our woodlands and orchards. 9 volunteers attended a General Pruning course provided by Heart of England Forest. This was focused on pruning woodland trees and builds on our previous training which dealt with fruit trees. An expert trainer who passes on their skills gives our volunteers essential knowledge needed to maintain the health of our trees and keep them free from disease. Heart of England are in the process of obtaining some additional fruit trees for us through a Wychavon Grant Scheme.

December and January see the start of the major job of pruning our fruit trees so if you have a few hours to spare on a Tuesday come along to Field Barn at 9.30am and one of our volunteers will show you what to do — even picking up the prunings is a great help and speeds up the process. Work will recommence on **Tuesday 9 January** after our Christmas Break.

SCHOOL VISITS: Badsey First School returned with 21 7/8 year olds to learn about Settlements and Land Usage. Ian Robinson devised a special presentation showing the children how the village and its inhabitants and their work has changed over the centuries. Learning where our food comes from and what is special about this area, which is still famed for its produce, is a really important lesson for youngsters. Evolving jobs and population is also significant especially in this fast moving world. Thanks to all the Volunteers who shared their knowledge and enthusiasm to make the day a great success. The children clearly enjoyed themselves and learnt a lot. One boy was worried about where Mr Wheeler plugged in his mobile phone in the Hovel. Trying to imagine a world pre mobiles and pre electricity proved to be a challenge too far!

Cleeve Prior First School – we are in the process of planning a tree planting visit – we are just awaiting the medlar and quince trees from Walcot Organic Nurseries! They will add diversity to Perry Pear Orchard and in time, fruit for jam and quince jelly.

CIDER: We have finally got the harvest in from our orchards and have been pressing many kilos of apples to produce juice for consumption now and cider for consumption in early summer 2024. Volunteers celebrated the Harvest with a shared lunch at Field Barn. Our newly pressed apple juice is now available at £3 a 75cl bottle. No additives just juice from the Orchards. A small quantity of cider and plum jam is still available.

We had a great turn out for the recent defibrillator training and fundraiser for Medics to Medics. Kate is a paramedic and, after demonstrating how to use the defib she went on to talk about how she got involved in taking medical supplies to Ukraine and set up Medics to Medics.

It was a fascinating story of how the work began with Kate deciding to do, what she thought would be, a 'one-off' trip. Through incredible tales of amazing

'coincidences' where she was able to meet up with various contacts across Ukraine, we learnt about how the work has grown. Kate knows exactly what is needed in the hospitals and "shops" accordingly. She is constantly raising money for supplies and juggles her paramedic role and family life with three children!

We were so pleased to raise £410 which will be used immediately to provide medical supplies. A trauma first aid kit costs £85 and we know that some of the people who attended from further afield were keen to provide some of these.


